5 - Fine mild day, Wind W. The
River not yet clear of Ice, but very soft.

6 - Very fine day, and calm

Went to Town, dined at Jas. Herretts
with a small party, roads very bad

7 - Clear pleasant day, Wind came out
at N. W. which keeps the inward bound
Vessels down the River & prevents their
cutting thro' the Ice, which extends from
Hawkins to Sparrows Point

Went to Town, returned to Dinner

8 - Hazy day, Wind N. E.

Went to Town, returned to dinner

Vessels still kept below the Fort
by Ice. Cloudy evening

9 Sunday, An extremely fine day, and
so warm, the Therm. in the sun was at 60.

No company, dined at Mr. S. Herretts

10 - Rainy morning, which continued until
12 o'clock, and cleared up mild, Wind S. W.

Went to Town, dined with a party at Mr.
Her? Browns. Roads very bad

11 - Fine clear day, Wind N. W.

Went to Town, dined at Jas. Herretts

The River is now entirely clear of Ice
and all the Vessels got up to the Wharves.
