Fourth

Our testimony against intoxicating liquors appears to be generally maintained, as nearly to our Disapline. The unnecessary frequenting of taverns is mostly avoided, but not so clear of attending places of dissipation. Moderation and temperance are mostly observed.

Fifth

The necessities of the poor are inspected and relief afforded, and care is taken to provide for the education of their children, and to comply with the other particulars of this Duty.

Sixth

Friends generally appear to maintain our testimony against an licentious ministry, oaths, military service, clandestine trade, finger-guards and lotteries. One report makes an abatement in some cases of the payment of a military tax, and some instances of marriage by the assistance of a paid minister.

Seventh

Friends appear to be generally careful to live within the bounds of their circumstances, and to avoid involving themselves in business beyond their ability to manage. They are generally just in their dealings and careful in complying with their engagements, and where any have given cause for fear in these respects care has been extended.

Eighth

Friends appear to bear our testimony against slavery. Those of the African race in Friends' families are provided for, and care is taken to instruct them in useful learning.

Ninth

Care is taken generally to deal with offenders seasonably and impartially, and to care for those who will not be reclaimed the spirit of meekness and love before they are disowned. One report admits that more care to reclaim in the spirit of meekness and love would be desirable.
