1880 28 The Standing Committee appointed to disburse the Fair Hill Funds for educational purposes made the following report, which was satisfactory to the Meeting, viz:

To the Yearly Meeting now sitting:

The Standing Committee reports: During the past year we have drawn upon the Treasurer of the Fair Hill Fund to the amount of \$1186.38 and used it within the limits of our several Quarterly Meetings, in aid of ten schools, in which there were one hundred and sixty children of Friends. Several of these schools were under the care of Monthly or Preparative Meetings, and eight of the teachers were Friends. Nine individuals were also aided at other institutions some of whom are preparing for teaching, and expect to re-fund a part of the money they are now using. The whole number of Friends children receiving aid is one hundred and sixty nine.

In our experience of twelve years, this is the first year that the Committee has been unable to meet the demands made upon it.

There appears to be an increased interest, in the cause of education, generally throughout our borders, and the applications received have been so much in excess of the Fund, at our disposal, that the Committee was obliged to cut them down in nearly every case. We are thus made to feel that, if a larger sum could be placed at our disposal, much more might be accomplished in the way of encouraging the establishing of schools, under our own care, and the employing of teachers in membership with us.
