The subject still requires of prayerful interest, as the temptation continues to present for improper and wrong use of that which is in itself useful, but when misapplied, becomes one of the most fruitful sources of misery and crime among mankind.

Our Monthly Meetings were encouraged to labor with offenders in that love which ever wins when rightly exercised.
