29, The Standing Committee to disburse the income of the "Fair Hill Fund" for Educational purposes, made the following report, which was read, and was satisfactory to the Meeting:

O Report of Com on Fair Hill fund.
To the Yearly Meeting now sitting;
The standing committee to disburse the income of the Fair Hill Fund, for educational purposes, report:

During the past year we have expended within the limits of our several Quarterly Meetings the sum of 1,034.50 in aid of eight schools in which there were 147 children of Friends. In addition to this, seven pupils were aided in other institutions, most of whom expect to engage in teaching, and to refund a part or the whole of the money used. Total number of pupils aided 154. All but two of the Schools were taught by Friends, and were under the care of Monthly or Preparative Meetings. One who drew on the fund a few years ago has refunded 10.00.

The disbursements for the year have been 34.00 less than the income of the fund.

In the death of Lydia L. Stabler, since our last annual report, and the disability of Wm M. Way, on account of seriously impaired health, we have lost two of our most active and efficient members, who
