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The Committee on Philanthropic Work made a report of their
labors the past year, as follows:

To the Yearly Meeting now sitting:

The Committee on Philanthropic Labor appointed two years ago
and continued last year, desire to report of the matters given in their
care as follows:

Philan- Truth compels us to acknowledge that we have fallen far behind our
thropic hopes and expectations in the amount of work that has been done during
Labor the past year. In summing up of results, the total seems so insignificant,
the gathering in of grain so small in comparison with the great extent of
the fields which are white unto harvest, that we feel humbled and almost
condemned as "unworthy stewards." The situation, however, is not without
its encouraging features; whilst we have been doing so little, others
have been doing much, and the great work of philanthropy has been
and is going on. There are many out in the world, some of them
members of our own Society we are glad to say, who, with ample means
and all facilities placed at their disposal by excellent charitable
organizations, are seeking to ameliorate the misfortunes of their fellow-
creatures. Great and good work is being done by these Societies, and
some of the members of our Committee have felt that there was greater
promise of results in working with them than with our own small,
unendowed, and in some localities, unorganized bodies of Friends.
