20 The Joint Standing Committee on Temperance made a report as follows:

To Baltimore Yearly Meeting:

The Yearly Meeting's Committee on Temperance submit the following report embracing information received from twelve of our Monthly Meetings:

In some places we find much interest has been manifested, and well organized effort has accomplished gratifying results, whilst in others but little has been done in a Committee capacity; but this in many cases has been supplemented by vigorous individual work in endeavoring to educate public sentiment by the circulation of temperance literature, public lectures, and otherwise. In Baltimore, 56,150 pages, besides pamphlets and other papers, have been distributed, and a large amount in country places.

A course of fifty lectures was delivered before the higher classes of Friends' School of Baltimore City, by a member of the Committee on Scientific Instruction, giving special attention to the effect of narcotics and intoxicants on the human system.

In many cases both individual and organized effort have been combined with that of other temperance organizations, to advance
