The Yearly Meeting now directs that the sum of three thousand two hundred dollars (\$3,200.00) be raised in the usual manner for use during the ensuing year.

Our Quarterly Meetings are directed to forward to the Treasurer their quotas respectively of the amount needed, at as early a date as may be practicable.

31. The Meeting now resumed the consideration of the state of our Society, and proceeded with the reading of the fourth Query. Pending the consideration of the answers to this Query, the Committee on Philanthropic Labor laid before the Meeting their report for the past year, which was read at this time, as bearing upon the subjects now engaging the attention of the Meeting.

To the Yearly Meeting now sitting:

The Committee on Philanthropic Labor offers the following report of work done throughout the limits of Baltimore Yearly Meeting, embracing a record of labor along the usual lines.

Many of the Prisons in the neighborhoods coming under our jurisdiction have been visited and some of them are thought to be in a sanitary condition; in others much improvement in this respect is needed. One of the members of the Baltimore Committee has been instrumental, through the medium of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, in having a supply of literature furnished to the inmates of the Prisons in Baltimore, and these papers have been eagerly received.

The Jail and Almshouse in Washington were visited every month, and flowers, writing material and reading matter distributed, the Bible read to the inmates, and such consolation afforded as the Committee were able to give. Much time has been given to this work.

While individual work is not discouraged, yet it is thought that more effectual labor in Prison Reform can be accomplished by uniting with organized Societies equipped for the purpose.
