The report upon being read, was approved. After a general expression upon the subject it was ordered that our Monthly Meetings be directed to transmit to their absent and isolated members copies of the published proceedings of this body, containing their names and addresses, as submitted by the Committee.

Our Monthly Meetings are also encouraged to continue an Epistolary correspondence with this class of their members.

The subject was further continued and the continuance of the Committee proposed, but without arriving at a conclusion, the Meeting adjourned to 3 o'clock this afternoon.

Thursday Afternoon, 3 o'clock.

The Meeting re-assembled near the time adjourned.

1890 The further consideration of the report of the Committee on Absent and Isolated members now engaged the attention of the Meeting as unfinished business from the morning session when, after a further discussion, it was decided to continue the Committee for further service in this direction.

Continuation of Committee on Absent and Isolated members.

1890 The Meeting now entered up the consideration of the condition of our Religious Society, as brought before us by the reading of the answers to the Queries from our constituent Quarterly Meetings, and proceeded as far therein at this session as the Fourth Query inclusive.

19 Consideration During the consideration of the answers brought before the Meeting we were earnestly admonished to cultivate humility in our intercourse with our fellow members, as well as deeper feelings of love and forbearance, which would make differences amongst us impossible, and would tend to draw us into closer bonds of Christian fellowship as becomes the profession that we make as members of a religious body.

We were also earnestly exhorted to greater faithfulness in the consistent upholding of our ancient testimony against the use of all forms of intoxicants, and our later testimony against the cultivation and the use of tobacco.

Pending the consideration of these most important subjects, the Meeting adjourned to 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Fourth-day Morning, 29 of the Month.

The Meeting convened at 10 o'clock.

20 The unfinished business from the morning session, viz: the further consideration of the Fourth Query was resumed.

Consideration of Fourth Query While the Meeting recognizes fully the delinquency noted in the summary answer adopted, that of a few members of Baltimore Monthly Meeting, the hope was again expressed that these Friends would be convinced and reclaimed and become consistent and useful members of our Society.

As this subject was especially referred to in the report of the Committee on Philanthropic Labor, the same was now read and engaged the attention of the Meeting, and is as follows:
