Report of the Committee on Philanthropic Labor.

Another year has been spent in the harvest fields of the Lord and once more we offer our sheaves, not boastful of our work and realizing how little has been accomplished of all that remains to be done, we are thankful to the Lord of the harvest for the privilege of entering into His labor.

Report of the Committee on Philanthropic Labor. These Friends have manifested a willingness to take charge of the work, each in his own department. They will probably also, correspond with the superintendents of similar lines of work in other Yearly Meetings, and thus learn the best methods. The question of sending delegates to the various Congresses held at Chicago for the consideration of philanthropic subjects, was settled by appointing those of our members who should attend, to represent us. The sum of One Hundred Dollars was appropriated as our proportion of the expense connected with these Congresses.

Peace and Arbitration.

While the spirit of strife and contention is still abroad in the world, it is gratifying to note that our testimony in favor of arbitration is being more and more recognized, and practically adopted as the best way to settle difficulties.

Within our own borders, conditions of peace have prevailed, so that active work has not been needed. We have, however, expressed our views when opportunity has offered, and distributed literature upon Peace and Arbitration for the benefit of others than our own members.

Temperance.

Earnest efforts have been made to spread temperance principles among our own people and others. To this end Temperance Day has been observed monthly in some of our First-day Schools, with appropriate texts, lessons, addresses, and distribution.
