

1894 The Joint Committee on Philanthropic Labor, laid before the Meeting the
 22 following Minute approved at a public meeting, held by the Committee
 last evening, and they now offer the same to the consideration of the
 Yearly Meeting, namely:
 "Believing that the use and sale of alcoholic Liquors as a beverage
 is a most serious obstacle to the progress of Christianity; that it
 causes the downfall of untold numbers of our brothers and sisters;
 and that it endangers the integrity of our Republic; the Religious
 Society of Friends, in Baltimore Yearly Meeting assembled, most
 earnestly protests against the licensing such sale of alcoholic liquors
 by City, State, or National Government, and urges the
 members of our Society to maintain a consistent opposition to
 the liquor power in all its forms, and against any system
 of obtaining revenue from them by the Government."

After a deliberate consideration of the subject embraced in
 the Minute, it received the full sanction and approval of
 the Meeting, and it was ordered that it be published in the
 proceedings of the Yearly Meeting as an affirmation of our
 judgment in furtherance of our testimony against this evil.

23 A Memorial of Little Falls Monthly Meeting of Friends
 held at Little Falls, Maryland, Second Month 6th, 1894,
 concerning our deceased friend, Abel A. Hull, and read in and
 approved by Baltimore Quarterly Meeting, held in joint session
 at Baltimore, Third Month 12th, 1894, was received from the
 Clerk of the Representative Committee, having been read and
 approved by them, and was read at this time, approved, and
 ordered to be endorsed by the Clerks and returned to the Clerk
 of the Representative Committee for recording.

Memorial of Harlington Hoopes
 A Memorial concerning our deceased friend, Harlington Hoopes,
 was also read from Little Falls Monthly Meeting, held Ninth Month
 4th, 1894, and read in and approved by Baltimore Quarterly
 Meeting, held in joint session at Gunpowder, Maryland, Ninth
 Month 10th, 1894, and read and approved by the Representative
 Committee. Upon being read in this Meeting it was approved,
 after an addition to its contents, and ordered to be handed to
 the Representative Committee for recording.

1894 In accordance with the order of the Yearly Meeting, adopted last year,
 24 the Meeting now adjourned, to convene tomorrow at 10 o'clock; the Session
 this afternoon at 3 o'clock, to be devoted to the consideration of matters
 to be brought before it by the Committee on Firstday Schools.
