

an age, yet her counsel was remem-
bered with much filial affection.

In 1771 she entered into the
marriage state with Joseph Elgar,
and after residing a short time at
Sand Springs, in Maryland, removed
within the verge of this Quarter-
ly Meeting. At Harrington monthly
meeting she was appointed to the
station of an Elder; and in 1790 was
recommended as a minister by Mon-
roville monthly meeting. In the
three succeeding years she visited
all the meetings belonging to this
quarter, and the families of two of its
monthly meetings, as also several
meetings belonging to other Quarters,
and afterwards made several religi-
ous visits to different meetings in
the states of New York, New Jersey,
Pennsylvania, Virginia and Ohio,

which, from the testimonies received,
were satisfactory.

In the year 1807 she became a
member of York Monthly and Par-
ticular Meeting where she was fre-
quently engaged in the exercise of
her gift, to the strengthening of the
weak, and the stirring up of the
lukewarm - often inviting the youth to
advocate the precious cause of Truth -
A cause which she testified was
dignified with honour and crowned
with ^{an} endless life. In 1811 she met
with a close trial in the death of
her husband. She was endued
with a strong mind and enlarged
understanding, which under the
influence of religious principle
rendered her very serviceable in
