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felt love for the whole human family.
One morning after passing through a
trying night she said "O that I could
be released altogether and be at rest.
I often feel very poor, but have no
remorse of conscience nor condemnation.
I only crave an easy passage at last,
and hope the Lord will receive my
soul, then all will be well". - And
she frequently said that she saw
nothing but peace before her.

She was favoured to retain her
senses to the last, and lay mostly
in a quiet frame of mind, express-
ing a grateful sense of the kindness
of her physician, and of those who
attended upon her, and departed
this life in peace, the 24th of the 10th.
