Under

the influence of that charity which breathes peace on earth and good will to men, he was led into deep sympathy for the Indian natives of this country, and when far advanced in life, was drawn to visit some of the tribes north west of the river Ohio. In this visit through a country then a wilderness, he endured many privations and suffered much fatigue, and exposure to personal danger, he was however preserved through them all, and has often been heard to say, that he felt peace of mind for his dedication to this service, and gratitude for the divine
