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Sixth Answer

Eighth Answer

Friends appear careful  
to bear a testimony against slavery &  
we believe those of the African race in  
friends families are suitably provided  
for and some care is taken to instruct  
them in useful learning.

Ninth Answer

Exhortations are mostly used  
to deal with offenders reasonably and  
impartially and to exhort to those who will  
not be reclaimed the spirit of meekness and  
love before they are disowned. More prompt-  
ness however in the administration of the  
discipline appears to be desirable.
