

The condition of the Meetinghouse at New Creek was brought to the notice of the Committee, and a sub-committee was appointed to assist Friends in collecting money to pay for building a new house. This is now ready for occupation. It is a handsome and commodious building. It has not, however, been all paid for.

A list of the names and addresses of the members of Baltimore Monthly Meeting, prepared under direction of this Committee, has been printed by order of that Meeting, and has proved to be very useful.

Several of the committee have attended Washington meetings frequently, and when it seemed practicable, have been paid to members residing in that city.

Two of the committee visited Friends at Monaca, and other parts of Adams County, Pennsylvania. They attended the meetings there on First day, and officiated two meetings, and visited all of the members in that neighborhood; two attended Spenwell Meeting once; Cummerville Meeting was attended, and a few of the more scattered members, belonging to it, were visited. Several of the committee attended Humming's Creek Quarterly Meeting at Beltsville on the sixth month, and at Humming's Creek on the ninth month. Baltimore and New Creek Meetings have also been visited; the meetings within the limits of Virginia, &c., Yearly Meeting only by the members of that meeting. Patuxent has not been visited.

We earnestly commend the subject of education within our limits to the attention of the Yearly Meeting. Reports sent to us show that in two or three of the Meetings there are some children who do not attend any school whatever, and that in three meetings a school under the care of Friends might be carried at least part of the year.

One meeting allows the use of its meetinghouse for a day school to another denomination.

Aid has been extended to several Friends, children in regard to education. The committee suggest that each Monthly Meeting raise a fund by voluntary subscription for educational purposes among our own meetings.

In conclusion we would recommend that the committee should be continued, as but little more than a survey has been made. We also feel that much good would result if more visits of a pastoral character were made.
