The Board of Trustees of this corporation, named by him, is composed of Francis White, Francis S. King, James Carey, de Caleb Winslow, Joseph P. Elliott, and Miles White Jr. of Baltimore, and Francis S. White, of Cincinnati.

By the provisions of the act of incorporation they are required to make annually a written statement of its operations, and of the disposition and condition of its property for the preceding year, and submit the same to the Baltimore Yearly Meeting of Friends, in unity with the ancient Yearly Meetings of Friends.

In compliance with the provision of the charter, the Trustees report that they have received the legacy of \$100.00, and interest amounting to \$2,158.75 making a total of \$113,158.75, and have paid collateral inheritance tax to the State of Maryland \$3,500.00 also \$51.35 for printing, record books etc, making a total of \$2,551.35, leaving a balance of \$99,607.40 as the amount of the fund now on hand, which is invested in a temporary loan to the city of Baltimore. When the fund reaches \$100,000 the amount of the original legacy the board will apply the interest, as it accumulates to the purposes specified in the charter.

All applications for the benefits of this fund must be made in writing.

To Baltimore Yearly Meeting of Friends

Dear Friends: At a meeting of the Executive Committee and other Friends interested in First-day schools and Home Mission Work, held Tenth Month 22nd 1877

Reports were received from all of the Monthly Meetings, from which it appears that there are 19 First-day schools under the care of Friends, with 939 persons belonging to them, and an average attendance of 516.
