

22. The following satisfactory report on first-day schools was read, and the Committee was continued to report next year.

*Is the Society Meeting?*

The Executive Committee on First-day Schools report there are 17 First-day Bible-schools under the care of Friends, two less than last year. We have reports from 16 of these, most of which show a decided increase in attendance and interest. One person was reported as belonging to them. The average attendance being 556, nearly the same as the previous year. The number of teachers is 50, besides 11 school officers. The number of Friends children attending these schools is 47, and of adult members 118. Several of the larger schools being what we termed Mission schools, two of them for colored people.

Most of the schools use the International series of lessons, but only few hold Teachers Meetings.

23. The Committee on "Home Missions" presented the following interesting report. They were continued, and we should remember that concern to the Society, especially of the members. Benjamin Lewis of Kentucky was added to the committee.

The Committee on "Home Missions" report, that at the close of your last Yearly Meeting, they decided that the members of the Committee should form, in their respective Meetings, Home Mission Associations, and should report to the central Committee in Baltimore, at Yearly Meeting time, all the work done by them during the year. In order to bring definitely before the Yearly Meeting the various branches of work contemplated by the Committee, an address was prepared, in the questionnaire, which was sent to them together with queries on these subjects to be answered by them.

The answers from the different neighborhoods show that in all the Meetings, except three, more or less Home Mission work has been done. In four, a regular organization has been effected, and, in one, while this was not the case, Committees on several branches of the work was organized. Owing to the want of statistical

abstract in many of the Reports, it is impossible to give an accurate account of our work done during the last year.

One Gospel Mission Meetings is held weekly, average attendance 30. One Mission Bible Class. Mothers meetings are maintained in these neighborhoods, average attendance 41. 13. 17. 31 Cottage Meetings have been held.

A Sea Meeting of working men chiefly was held nine times during the winter, average attendance 41.

A number of our members have been actively engaged in Temperance work, and in efforts to reclaim the fallen. In our work you definitely see the conversion of sinners, and in this respect the Lord has been pleased to bless our efforts.

A number have signed the temperance pledge. We are of the opinion that the Committee should be continued, and encouraged to renewed efforts in this direction.
