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The minutes of the Representative Meeting were read, our were much interested in the subjects which have claimed its attention & care the past year. Their proceedings met with our heart approval. Our Treasurer was directed to pay to the Treasurer of the Associated Indian Committee our portion of \$2.50 received by it in the prosecution of its labors this year. The report of the Committee on Indian Affairs is as follows:

Indian Report.

To the Yearly Meeting.

The following is a condensed summary of the work of the Associated Committee of Friends among the Indians the past year.

(1) Two agents formerly named by us continue to give excellent service: - Drs D. Miles of the Chesapeake & Arapahoe, & Laband D. Miles of the Snake Agency. They have under their charge 144 Indians.

(2) Six schools comprising last year 670 children have been taught by Friends; three women Friends teach in the Wichita & Kiowa schools.

(3) All these schools have been aided clothing & appliances to render them more efficient.

(4) Four Friends & their wives reside among the Indians as missionaries; one visits the Senecas as a missionary.

(5) The Modoc have a Mission Meeting with 20 members which is practically a Friends Meeting. Steamboat Frank has been acknowledged as a minister, & two other Indians are exhorters. Their meetings are orderly, pretty well attended, & also F. E. Meline, Public Watchman, Shepherd & feed this flock. They are really Christians, though arakous Creeding case.

They are doing well in all domestic affairs. Friends Meetings held among the Kansas with 20 members. These are members of Timber Hill Monthly Meeting & Kansas.

They are likely, from last account, to have a large accession soon; before long, will probably be formed into a Monthly Meeting.

(6) A Methodist Church has been formed at the Wyandotte Indian School with 38 members. This is preparation for such Indians becoming Friends if it be found best.

(7) Jeremiah Hubbard holds meetings each month at two places among the Senecas of the Indian Territory. All our people went there, they refused Christianity. Now, some have embraced it & the meetings are largely attended, & on some occasions.

(8) A school house & meeting house has been built for some Shawnees in the Indian Territory, who are to know Friends through their boarding school.

(9) Franklin Elliott has a Friends Meeting ^{among} the Pottawatomie, in the central part of the Territory. There are now 13 members who are believed to be steady Christians. He has been very cautious about admissions. They perform the functions of a Monthly Meeting to some extent, - have two deacons or exhorters. They have received gifts for mutual edification, & one seems likely to become a minister.

(10) F. Elliott's work among the absentee Shawnees is beginning to bear fruit, although slowly. Two of their young men chosen by them for their future chief & interpreter, were sent by us to Hampton. Both have their professed Christianity. Two other boys were taken to Hampton by agent Miles recently.

(11) Jonathan O'Brien & wife are among the Ojaghs. Lately they have bought a little house there for \$200. They visit the Ojagh & Kiowa schools, & preach to the children, &c. They are well received by the older bands, & have held meetings among them in their homes.

(12) Jonathan O'Brien reports a meeting held recently in the Ojaghs. These people have been so degraded that their attendance at the meeting, & their assertion that they wish to lead better lives give hope even for them.

(13) E. Chananah & Jane Chananah are among the
