

meeting, at Cutaw Street, have been well attended, and good work has been done.

The report from Ashton shows that there is a regular Home Mission Association there, and 16 adults and 11 children are actively engaged in the work. Black Creek reports that they have an association there, and that a large number of Gospel and Temperance meetings have been held since last year; Cottage Bible readings have also been carried on at Corinth. There has been no association kept up at New Creek, but some work has been done in distributing tracts, and a sewing meeting is held six months of the year; most of the young women belong to the W. C. T. U. Richmond reports that a Home Mission Association exists only in name, but that there is some Mission work done by Friends in their own responsibility. There is no Home Mission Association at Patuxent, but something is done in the cause of Temperance, and some tracts and testaments have been distributed.

Bellefonte reports that while there is no regular association for Home Missions, there is a lively interest taken in union Christian work by most of the Friends. Semerton reports no association; some of their members are engaged in Home Mission work. Fishertown, no report. Washington reports that four members are interested in Mission work, but no association has been formed. Lincolnton reports no association yet formed, but a growing interest of all the members in Mission work. Hopewell reports no association; two or three engaged in Mission work. Curwensville, no report.

While much can be done by a few earnest workers without organization, we would encourage our Friends to organize where it is possible, and as much as possible to interest the younger members of the meeting in Mission work of some kind or other.
