Report of the Educational Committee.

The members of the Educational Committee in Baltimore have met from time to time at the call of the Chairman, and have endeavored to carry out the purposes of their appointment as far as possible with the funds contributed. They do not feel that they have had quite the sympathy and support that the cause demands, but they believe that Friends only need to have the importance of the thorough education of all our children properly brought before them, in order to secure their warm interest and pecuniary encouragement. They would therefore urge the Yearly Meeting to take such steps as it may deem advisable to bring the subject before our membership generally. By letters received from all the subordinate Meetings, they find that nearly all the children in our Yearly Meeting who need assistance have been provided for, though not altogether by the fund of the committee. The Miles White Association has sent several to Westtown and New Garden, the Way Fund has been used for others, and some have been sent by private subscription. The committee has found it desirable to work in two ways, 1st In helping established schools in neighborhoods where there are a number of Friends children, by extending the School term from one to three months. Where practicable, they have encouraged
