The Committee on Foreign Missions made the following report, with an account of their receipts and expenditures.

Report of the Committee on Foreign Missions.

The Executive Committee in Baltimore has met as occasion required, and has endeavored to promote an interest in the work, by correspondence with the members of the Committee throughout the Yearly Meeting, and by forwarding Missionary literature to them monthly. We have also held one Foreign Mission Meeting in Baltimore, and three in other places during the year. We are informed that the other members of the Committee have in several instances made organized efforts in their different neighborhoods to promote an interest in the cause.

Mexico. Since last Yearly Meeting, we have received two reports from the Mexican Mission. The latest one, a letter from Samuel Purdie, dated Victoria, Mexico, Tenth Month 5th, 1857, speaks of a wide opening in that city for the work of Friends, and earnestly intreats us to continue our support of the Mission. He has this year forwarded \$400.00 to Mexico through the Foreign Mission Committee of Indiana Yearly Meeting.

Syria. Theophilus Haldemir continues to send us very encouraging accounts of the condition of the Baltimore School at Dar Esalam. Syria. As Friends are aware, this is a Day School in a small village on the Lebanon, under the care of a native teacher. At last report the attendance was about 35, and the progress of the children has been extremely good. Our Friends John and Sarah Hurbin paid two visits to it, holding a Gospel Meeting with the scholars on the second occasion, which was a time of great interest.
