

To Baltimore Yearly Meeting of Friends:

Dear Friends:—The Trustees of the Miles White Beneficial Society, in conformity with its Act of Incorporation, submit the following statement of its operations for the past year:

Since the last report, there has been purchased 1 Cincinnati Lebanon and Northern Railroad Bond of \$1000, at a cost of \$1012.50. Otherwise there has been no change in the investments.

Interest to the amount of \$5390 has been received; and \$4651 has been distributed, as follows: \$2668.55 for charitable objects; \$1476.65 for educational purposes; \$355.80 for distribution of books and tracts, and \$150 has been advanced as a loan for educational purposes.

- 31 The Committee on Peace made the following report, which was acceptable to the Meeting, and our Treasurer was directed to pay M. M. White, Treasurer to the Peace Association of Friends in America, the sum of \$100 in aid of the Association. They were continued, and authorized to send a delegate to a proposed Conference of Friends on the subject of Peace, to be held twelfth month in this year, at Richmond, Indiana. John Nicholson was released from the Committee, at his own request, and Richard H. Thomas was added to the Committee, which was continued to have this important subject under their care for the ensuing year. Twenty dollars was appropriated for the use of the Committee.

Report of the Peace Committee
To the Yearly Meeting

The Committee has found little opportunity for concerted action during the past year.

The meeting to be addressed by William Jones, of England, to which reference was made in our last report, was held as proposed, and his address was

well received. He also addressed an appointed meeting on Peace, at Lincoln, under the auspices of members of this Committee.

Members of our Committee in Ashton Meeting have held one successful meeting, in Ashton, addressed by John B. Wood, Secretary of the Peace and Arbitration Society.

Two members of Baltimore Meeting (not members of this Committee) have held, and addressed three appointed meetings on the subject, two of which were within the limits of the Yearly Meeting. There will be no opportunity for a public meeting on Peace during the present Yearly Meeting, as other arrangements have been made for each evening.

We have had no occasion to use the twenty dollars appropriated for the use of the Committee at our last Yearly Meeting, and the money is left in the hands of the Treasurer of the Yearly Meeting.

We herewith present the 23rd Annual Report of the Secretary of the Peace Association of Friends in America, addressed to Baltimore Yearly Meeting.

A call has recently been issued for a meeting of delegates from all the standing Committees on Peace of the American Yearly Meetings, at Richmond, Indiana, on the 9th of 12th month, 1890, to consider ways and means for carrying on the work more effectually. Each Committee has been requested to send one or more delegates.

If the Yearly meeting decides to continue this Committee or appoint a new one, we recommend an expression of its judgment on the proposition to send a delegate to the proposed Conference, and that the necessary appropriation be made to meet the expense, if the sending of a delegate is recommended.
