

by Friends generally, - but those on other Days of the Week, and for Discipline, appear in most places to have been too much neglected by some. - Unbecoming Behaviour generally avoided except some instances of Drunkenness; - and the hour of Meeting nearly observed.

2. Love and Unity, as becometh our Christian Profession, appear to have been generally maintained, - Tale bearing and detraction discouraged; - and a general care exercised to end apparent Differences. -

3. Many Friends appear to have been careful to educate their children (and those under their care in plainness of Speech, Deportment &c. &c.) - to guard them against reading pernicious Books and from the corrupt conversation of the World; - as also to encourage their reading the holy Scriptures; - but all the accounts express a Deficiency in these interesting particulars.

4. Friends are clear of importing; - and many friends of vending distilling (and the unnecessary Use of spirituous Liquors; the several accounts express that some Deficiencies exist in these latter respects. - Frequent Taverns unnecessarily and attending at places of Division appear to have been mostly avoided; - and Moderation and Temperance generally observed. -

5. - The necessities of the Poor appear to have received the general attention of Friends, - and some care has been extended in regard to the School - Education of their children. -

6. - Our Testimonies against a hireling Ministry, Oaths, Military Services, - clandestine Trade, Prize Goods, and Lotteries are generally maintained; - except that two accounts mention Deficiencies in regard to our Testimonies against Military Services, which are said to be under care. -

7. Friends appear generally careful to live within the bounds of their circumstances; - to avoid involving themselves in Business beyond their ability to manage; - to be just in their dealings and punctual in fulfilling their contracts; - but all the accounts except one mention some Deficiencies in regard to punctuality, which are said in some instances to be under care. -

8. - Our Testimony against Slavery appears to be generally supported. Those of the African race who have had their Freedom secured and live in Friends' families are provided for, - and some care is said to be taken to instruct them in useful Learning. -

9. Care is generally taken to deal with Offenders in a good degree answerable to the Language of the Query. -
