6th Summary

7th Summary

Friends are generally careful to live within the bounds of their circumstances and to avoid involving themselves in business beyond their ability to manage. They appear just in their dealings and as far as appears generally careful in complying with their engagements.

8th Summary

We believe Friends generally endeavor to bear a faithful testimony against slavery. The reports are clear except in one instance where the husband of the friend is not a member. Those of the African race under our care are suitably provided for,

and some care is taken to instruct them in useful learning.

9th Summary

Care is mostly taken to deal with offenders seasonably and impartially, and to win to those who will not be reclaimed the spirit of meekness and love, before they are disowned.

10th Summary

Rebecca Waring, an elder and member of Nottingham and Little Britain Monthly Meeting, deceased the 10th of the 12th month 1863 in the 91st year of her age.

Friends appear generally careful to place their children as far as practicable for tuition, under the charge of teachers in membership with us. Though one report states that some children attend neighboring schools.
