The habit thus formed, although perhaps at first distasteful, will become easy and pleasant, more especially if the parents themselves evince a lively interest and enjoyment in the performance of this duty. Put your children with yourselves in the way of blessing. Tell them that the Lord does

gather with the smallest assembly of His people, to teach and to bless them, and as they faithfully wait upon Him, He will open the mouths of some to testify of His love and mercy, and also make the silent gatherings, times of great refreshing and peace. Loving admonitions and fervent prayers were offered for all our members, that they might be aroused and stimulated to press on and upward in the Christian race; that there might be more single-hearted seeking, to know the will of the Lord concerning us; that there might be more individual faithfulness, and far more willing obedience to His will when made known to us. To every one of us is given time and opportunity, and a work to do for the Lord, and it is a solemn reflection that we have no more time than is sufficient to perform that work.
