The report of the Committee on Devotional Meetings was accepted. (see Men's Minutes).

Anna B. Thomas, George H. Emmott, and Lydia W. Haviland were added to the Peace Committee.

Francis L. King, Miles White, Jr., John P. Cary, John Nicholson, Jane E. White, and Elizabeth R. Hopkins were appointed to unite with the Clerks in arranging the order of business for the next Yearly Meeting.

The Treasurer's report was read and accepted. (see Men's Minutes)

The Committee on Endorsements presented the usual form, and the Clerk was directed to place it on the Minutes of Friends now in attendance.

The Committee to consider the proposition from Kansas Yearly Meeting relative to changing our name from "The Religious Society of Friends" to "Friends' Church" made a report which was accepted. (see Men's Minutes.)

The Statistical Report, showing our present membership to be 989, was accepted.

The Committee on Correspondence produced Epistles to the Yearly Meetings of London, Dublin, Canada, New York, New England, North Carolina, Ohio, Indiana, Western, and Kansas.

With some changes they were accepted, and the Clerk was directed to sign them on behalf of the Meeting, and forward them.

An Epistle to the children, and one to our absent sisters, were read and accepted. The Meeting directed that 500 copies of the letter to the children, and 200 copies of the letter to our absent sisters be printed.
