Minutes of the Exercise on the State of Society in the Yearly
Meeting on Ministry and Oversight, 1910.

We rejoice in the assurance that our God is ever waiting to bless.
The Holy Spirit has been poured out. Jesus Christ the Baptiser is our Savi-
or and He waits to do His work of grace upon us. In the power of this
blessed baptism we may be made more than conquerors through Him that saved us.
The religion of Jesus Christ is for hard times as well as for easy times. Un-
less we are saved from our sins and in our troubles we have not yet learned
the true secret of the Lord. The world is watching us to see whether Christ
is really able to save. When they see us varying with every change in our
feelings or surroundings, they naturally conclude that the boasted power of
Christ is only a beautiful fable.

Christ's power is as much needed in outward prosperity. This is
often a time of real temptation, not the less real because insidious and
unrecognised. The hard times drive us to Christ and we find Him able to
save, but in prosperity we are too prone to lean upon our own strength which
is never anything but weakness. It is an ABIDING trust that we need, and
this is what we as Friends have ever testified to and sought to experience.

The best solace for one's private ills is to lose one's self in
the work. We need a broader outlook on the world that knows not God to en-
able us to realise the need for a message of victory. When we know the pow-
er of Christ to overcome our own troubles we can go with a message of hope
to others.

To really practise the presence of Christ covers the ground of per-
sonal experience and of service for others. Some of you undervalue the ser-
vice to which you are called. You measure its possibilities by your own in-
ability and not by God's power. A Christian experience is to be a river,
ever flowing, growing wider and deeper as it flows. All rivers are not alike;
the Nile overflows its banks every year and fertilises the land of Egypt;
the Thames flows through the largest city of the world and bears on its bosom
the ships of all nations, but when it overflows its banks, it brings disaster
and not blessing. So each fulfills its own course and serves God and man in
so doing. Yet with all their differences the river water is much the same
in all, and whatever our outward surroundings or our individual call to ser-
vice, we all need the grace of God and nothing else can suffice.

We long to see our young people coming out into the work. Perhaps
we older ones need to leave them free to try things out in their own way.
Let us have the enthusiasm of our own principles, and teach our young people
that even when they are toiling with their hands at the daily tasks of life
they can be serving God and giving His message.

We believe that the Meeting for worship is after all the real
place for the development of the gift of the ministry; we do not so much need
prepared sermons as prepared ministers, and it is the Lord alone who can tru-
ly prepare and qualify them, yet we should encourage the best possible cul-
tivation of all their gifts. Perhaps we have not sufficiently magnified the
ministry of the word, we need to see that it claims our deep and constant
interest. It is after all a warm sympathetic atmosphere that is so much
needed to develop this gift. The Thames sometimes freezes up and that means
the stopping of commerce and starvation to many, but when the wind changes,
like magic the ice disappears and the water flows again. So with our meet-
ings - it is the warm breath of the Holy Spirit that creates the atmosphere
in which the gifts can grow.
