

At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Yearly Meetings Pastoral Committee and the Cooperating Committee of Baltimore Monthly Meeting, held 12th mo 5th 1884. Chairman absent, present 18 members.

After a time of prayer the meetings were taken up in order.

Balto. Mary S. Thomas referred to a concern of Helen B. Harris, that the members of the meeting as well as the attenders who are not members, should be visited by the Committee. - It was also suggested that a social meeting be held on 7th day evening next in connection with the Yearly Meeting, which was agreed to. -

Eliza R. Stephens stated that a number of isolated visits had been made among the women members of the meeting.

The Correspondent Rees stated that she had written to four Monthly Meetings' correspondents, but had rec'd. no answers.

Federal John C. Thomas reported a series of seven meetings held by Seth and Stueda Rees, and that great good had been done - that several had been much stirred up and had continued so - the average attendance

had decidedly increased - 55 to 55 in morning and 65 to 67 in evening meetings.

Ashton. Mary S. Thomas stated that there was a great desire for a preparative meeting there - that the meeting was in very good condition and that there was no recorder minister, there were often four or five communications on First Day Mornings.

Washington This Meeting has not been visited since the Yearly Meeting.

Hopewell. Mary S. Thomas stated that she has heard regularly from this meeting and that the Bible Class and Religious Meetings are both in flourishing conditions - the reports from Loudoun also were encouraging.

Potomac. Nothing has been heard from this meeting since the Yearly Meeting.

Deer Creek. A Bible Class has been started there with a good attendance - A. Y. W. C. A. has also been well started.
