The following is an abstract of a very interesting written report from John W. Parker of his visit to the Northern Virginia and West Virginia - taken from interchange of 4/15/

John N. Parker, in his visit to Virginia last month, visited Somerton Meeting on the 14th. On the evening of the same day he attended a meeting at the house of the neighborhood. On the 15th he visited the 1st Baptist School, taught by Alfred White, and the 2nd Baptist School, taught by Nannie Lee. On the day following he visited Black Creek School, taught by Nannie Lee, after which he attended the regular meeting for worship and Preparation, and was much interested in hearing the report of their committee on Home Mission work, visiting families, house, etc. The membership appears to be actively engaged in work, visiting families, holding Bible readings, cottage meetings, and distributing tracts. On the afternoon of the same day he visited the Mission house at Berea. On the 18th he visited Corinth School, taught by Julia S. White and Inez Cobb. In the evening he addressed a Temperance Meeting on the subject of Prohibition. He reports that the question of Local Option is being earnestly pushed in that section of the country. He found on arriving at Richmond that Friends are also very active in the same cause. The vote is to take place on the 26th instant. He did not attend any meeting at this place, but passed on to visit our Friends in Caroline Co., who have moved there from Canada. There are seven of them, and they appear to have been warmly welcomed by the community, and are engaged in Christian work. Two parlor meetings were held in the house of John R. Moore.
