The Committee appointed by this board to consider the minute adopted by the Yearly Meeting touching the subject of Capital Punishment have considered the subject and believing that the Abolition of Capital punishment would neither detract from the dignity of the State nor interfere with the due punishment of Criminals provided life imprisonment is substituted for the death penalty and the power of pardon in such cases is taken from the Executive - He believes Capital punishment is not a question to be treated from a sentimental standpoint but should be viewed in its practical application to the safety of Society.

Mr. Thompson recommended that action be taken by this body in favor of the

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Abolition of the Death penalty.

The Clerk was instructed to inform the Yearly Mtg. of vacancies in this board caused by the death of our dear friends Samuel N. Brown, Richard A. Ricks and Isaac Brooks, Jr.
