The Matter of Minute #26 of Baltimore Yearly
 Meeting of 1911 Concerning the Inter-
 State Liquor Traffic referred to John
 C. Thomas and John T. Parker for
 action received attention, and
 the following Memorial was sent to
 the U. S. Senate through Senator
 Radnor Rayner and to the
 House through Congressman J.
 Charles Linthicum viz;

To the United States Senate, Washington D.C.
 Memorial: The Permanent Board of
 Baltimore Yearly Meeting of Friends (Orthodox)
 representing over 1200 Members in Maryland
 Virginia and western Pennsylvania at a
 meeting held February 8th 1912, unanimously
 adopted the following Memorial to be

presented to Congress through the proper
 Channels, viz;

In view of the fact that
 the present Inter-State Commerce Law
 operates as a practical nullification
 of State and local attempts to escape
 from the evils of the Liquor Traffic,
 we respectfully petition Congress
 to grant relief by passing as speedily
 as possible Senate bill #4043;
 or the similar measure known as
 House Bill #16,214, commonly called
 the Sheppard-Kinyon Bill.

Signed by direction and on behalf of the
 Meeting aforesaid, John T. Parker Clerk.
 To this Memorial favorable responses
 were had from both Senator Rayner
 + J. Charles Linthicum, and the
 Matter was presented Apr. 30 to the
 Senate by Senator Rayner.
