

Baltimore, March 24th, 1915.

To the Permanent Board of the Baltimore Yearly Meeting:

Your Committee on Titles to Meeting House Properties would report as follows:

In the matter of the Fishtown Meeting House property the report of L. Oscar Moon to the Permanent Board hereto attached, shows that, at the present time, the title is held by one surviving trustee who is reported to be in feeble health. Your committee would suggest that Dunning's Creek Monthly Meeting be requested to name new trustees and have the title to the property transferred to them by the present surviving trustee. There would be no real objection to the present trustee being named as one of the grantees in the new deed if he desired to continue as one of the trustees.

In the matter of the Curwensville Meeting House property L. Oscar Moon also reports that he had forwarded to Blanchard & Blanchard, Attorneys-at-Law, of Bellefonte, Pennsylvania, the data necessary to enable the attorneys to prepare the papers and put the title in proper shape, but no reply had been received by him to his communication.

Under the Deeds from Irwin & Co., to Zachariah McNeal, trustee, the first dated April 20th, 1878 and recorded in Clearfield County, Pennsylvania in Deed Book No. 13, folio 268, and the second dated May 8th, 1893 and recorded in Deed Book No. 76, folio 402, the property therein described was conveyed for the use of the members of Centre Monthly Meeting held at Bellefonte. Upon the death of the trustee Centre Monthly Meeting, on or about the 19th of August, 1903, directed that the property should be held subject to the control of Curwensville Monthly Meeting, and thereupon procured a deed to be executed by Stephen W. McNeal, the common law heir of
