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They also presented a Memorial of their Board of Trustees Concerning the loss by death of their Secretary-Treasurer Charles G. Thomas.

The Committee on Titles to Meeting House property made the following report, and, at his own request, Samuel R. Neave was released from the Committee, and the name of Lewis C. Moon was added.

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Baltimore, Nov. 11th, 1925.

To the Permanent Board:

The Committee on Titles would report that it employed George R. Bigler, an Attorney of Clearfield, Pa., and instructed him to proceed with the matter of procuring the title of Curwensville Meeting House properly confirmed in the Baltimore Yearly Meeting.

The Petition for the Court has been prepared and awaits execution by the Clerk of the Baltimore Yearly Meeting. We recommend that the proceeding be prosecuted to a Decree. If a Deed can be procured from the surviving Trustees of Curwensville who are Al McNaul and Harvey J. Cook both of Curwensville the matter would be much simplified. These Trustees have expressed a willingness to execute such a Deed provided the Baltimore Yearly Meeting will agree to hold the property for public use and from sale for a period of 25 years. It is suggested that this proposition be accepted for 15 years if the surviving Trustees of Curwensville will agree to see that the property is kept in good repair during the period the Baltimore Yearly Meeting agrees to hold the property for public use.

Your Committee would further report, that the titles to Bellefonte, Pennsylvania, and also to Corinth, Virginia Meeting House properties are not yet completed.

This Committee asks to be released from further service.
