

At a meeting of the Committee on Indian concerns, appointed by Baltimore Yearly Meeting in unity with the Ancient Yearly Meetings of Friends held the 13th of the 1st month 1832

Joseph King Esq. was appointed to serve the Committee as Clerk at this time.

The following Extract from the proceedings of the Yearly Meeting were produced and read, being as follows, viz^t:

+ "At a Yearly Meeting of Friends held in Baltimore on the western shore of Maryland and the adjacent parts of Pennsylvania, and Virginia, by adjournments from the 31st of the 10th month to the 5th of the 11th month inclusive, 1831

The attention of the meeting having been directed to the interesting concerns of the civilization of the Indians natives, and no report having been made for several years past by the committee heretofore appointed on that subject, it was concluded to appoint a committee to nominate to a future sitting of this meeting, some suitable Friends to be added to those who now stand under that appointment, on behalf of this Meeting, remaining in unity with us. George Williamson, Nicholas Kohlman and Thomas Scott, were accordingly appointed in the service and directed to nominate one of the number, to act as

Treasurer to the committee when so appointed.

2^d of the 11th month and 4th of the 12th month

The committee appointed at a former sitting, to propose to the meeting, some suitable Friends to be added to the committee on Indian concerns, made the following nomination, viz^t: Hugh Balderson, William Proctor, Joseph Townsend, Eliza N. Browne, Thomas Scott, David Unicom, Isaac Brooks, Joseph King Esq. (Treasurer), Daniel Cobb, Samuel Carey, John Griffith Esq. and Samuel Worthington; which was approved, and they were accordingly appointed to the service and desired to take charge of this concern and report their proceedings to the meeting next year. Those of the former committee who have joined in the separation from our religious society, and who are not yet disowned from membership with us, are released, and all their acts and proceedings as a committee, other than those reported by them to the meeting prior to the year 1829, are not acknowledged by us.

They also proposed Joseph King Esq. to serve as Treasurer to the committee on Indian concerns which was united with, and he appointed to act in that capacity on behalf of the meeting.
