

In the reports of 1823, we again find a reference to Ohio Yearly Meeting on this concern, and so on until the year 1826, when we find the following language: - "Our brethren of Ohio and Indiana Yearly Meetings, who are associated with us in this work of benevolence, and to whose active attention it (the Indian concern) has been confided, have in the prosecution of the concern, evinced a patience and zeal which allude to us entire satisfaction; and while there remains a prospect that any future exertions on behalf of this suffering and injured people can be useful, we feel full confidence that every opportunity which may offer will be improved, in rendering them such aid and instruction as will be consistent with the trust reposed, and the means placed at our disposal."

The present meeting was attended by David Bailey and Henry Harvey, two Friends who were deputed by the Committee on Indian concerns of Indiana Yearly Meeting of Friends to accompany certain Indian Chiefs belonging to the Shawanese nation, for the purpose of applying to Congress for relief on account of

the departure from a preliminary arrangement for a treaty, and proposed and agreed on by the commissioners on the part of the United States, and understood, and ascertained to by the Shawanese Indians, confirmed by the testimony of our aforesaid friend, Henry Harvey, who was present when the compact was entered into; - a detailed statement of H. Harvey's testimony, and extracts from Gardners Treaty, with the Shawanese Indians, have been left with our committee on Indian concerns.

Our Friends aforesaid, informed us, that they had visited Washington, accompanied by the Chiefs and an Interpreter, and that they had placed a memorial to Congress, and other documents, in the hands of Benjamin Ruggles, and Caring, Senators from the State of Ohio, and Joseph Vance and Judge - Crane, Representatives in Congress from the State of Ohio.

The Friends not having been able to accomplish the object of their visit, during their stay at Washington, requested the aid of our committee on Indian concerns, to give such further attention to the subject as we might deem necessary, and Joseph Townsend, George T. Flohr and Hugh Baldwin, were appointed to attend thereto, and to report to the general committee when prepared.
