These communications being recorded amongst the minutes of our proceedings, are submitted to the consideration of the meeting, as exhibiting a view of the unabated and deep concern of our brethren of these Yearly Meetings on the subject, as also furnishing an account of their labours for several years past, for the benefit and improvement of the Indian natives, under our joint notice and care.

Some attention has been paid, agreeably to the direction of the meeting last year, in relation to the Request of the late Sarah Lane to our Yearly Meeting, and the Yearly Meeting of Ohio, for the benefit of the Indians under our care towards civilization; but we are not yet in possession of the necessary information to enable us to state whether it will be obtained or otherwise.

✓ This Meeting being informed by the report and minutes of the Committee on Indian Concerns, that the Shawanese have ceded their lands at Waughpaukonetta, to the United States, and are about removing west of the Mississippi, and that in consequence thereof the Committees of Ohio and Indiana Yearly Meetings have suggested for consideration the expediency of the sale of the Farm
