

At a meeting of the Committee on Indian concerns held Baltimore 10th month 28. 1833.

Present nine members

The Friends appointed in case of Sarah Daves request, report they have forwarded the papers to Tho^{rs} Stewardson of Philad^a as directed at last meeting: and that the case is still pending in the U.S. Circuit Court for Pennsylvania. They are continued.

The Friends appointed at last meeting produced a report for the yearly meeting being a summary of our proceedings for the past year, which was approved, and the Clerk directed to sign it in behalf of the committee.

Adjourned to meet on the 12th day of 12th month next at 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

At a Special meeting of the committee on Indian concerns held Baltimore 11th mo. 25. 1833.

Present Seven members.

The following communication from the committee on Indian concerns of Ohio yearly meeting was this day received and read. The consideration of the plan proposed for the future operations of the several committees, is referred to our next stated meeting (in 2nd mo next).

"At a Special meeting of the committee on Indian concerns held the 15th of 11th month 1833.

"A communication was received from the committee of

Baltimore yearly meeting and one from the Committee of Indiana, the latter containing a proposed plan for future operations. The further consideration of this is left to the regular meeting in the 2nd month next. The Clerk is directed to acknowledge the receipt of these letters and also forward a copy of the proposed plan to the Committee of Baltimore for their consideration, and proposing to that Committee, that they should correspond with the Committee of Philadelphia yearly meeting, in order to have their advice in respect to our accepting a part of the funds of Government to aid us in our efforts for the Civilization of the Indians.

The plan is as follows.

"We are willing to propose as a plan for the proceedings of the committee in future, that the concern of the civilization of the Shawnee Indians who have heretofore been under our care, and who have removed and are now living on the Kansas river, be carried on by the three yearly meetings of Baltimore, Ohio, and Indiana; and that the entire part of the business devolve on the committees of Ohio and Indiana jointly.

That there be a suitable family placed among the Indians as Superintendent, and a school kept up regularly with at least twenty five scholars, who are to be taught the use of letters, and the domestic arts.

That the children of such Friends as may reside among the Indians, may be permitted to attend the school, which will doubtless be to the further advancement of the Indians.
