

In addition to the foregoing report and narrative we believe it right further to state to the Committee, that we were informed by the United States agent who has charge of the Wyandots at upper San Duskey, that these Indians have almost entirely abandoned the use of spirituous liquors, and very generally betaken themselves to habits of industry; we were also assured by him, that at the late Council held near Piqua not one from this Village had been drunk, and that notwithstanding they rec^d. at that time from the Government, \$3500 in cash, ^{on account of their annuity} as an indemnity for their losses during the late war, and many efforts were made by designing persons to induce them to purchase drink, they resolutely refused to expend one cent in that way, but concluded to take the whole of their money home, and apply it in the improvement of their houses, and procuring farming utensils. We were further informed by the same agent, that the Indians generally at this Council, departed themselves in an unusually correct and prudent manner, and that although 700 were collected from various tribes, it was his opinion, that there were not more than 10 of them during the whole time intoxicated.

It also appears that the Wyandots have an excellent mill seat in their Village on the Sandusky river, and that they as well as the Indians near Stony Creek, are extremely anxious to have mills built and to
