The Boy who to Norfolk agreed to accompany the passengers from Norfolk but was not able to say how much until next week."

The report was accepted and approved.

The Committee appointed to select a suitable hotel or boarding house for friends to stop at was continued.

The Executive Committee reported that they had passed Susan Cox, wife & three children of Wendell C. Cox to Indiana on the 22nd inst and Sarah Haring of Guilford to be to Richmond on the 24th inst of them needing assistance which was furnished.

And Dickerson, Anne & Dickerson and Sarah P. Smith of Norfolk and John L. Crockett of Baltimore were elected members of the Association.

The Treasurer was requested to remit thirty dollars (\$30) to Dr. J. W. Clark of Port mouth in addition to the sum (\$25) paid him by Francis D. King and he is requested to make monthly reports of his disbursements to the Board.

The President was requested to write to Mrs. Suffolk of Norfolk to inquire about the condition of friends in that vicinity. A Committee consisting of Mary Ellice, Margaret Luning and Mary King was appointed to collect old clothes from women friends and friends were directed to send clothing for men to the warehouse of Script Mansfield. Her adjourned to our next regular meeting.

Done Pursuant to the

Pursuant to call of the President the Board met 1st month 18th. Eight members present.

The Minutes of the preceding meeting were read and approved.

Francis D. King reported, that the N.C. RR had agreed to pass our friends over their route at soldier's fare, which is about three fourths the usual rate.

He also reported, that he had written to Oliver Suffolk regarding the condition of friends in his vicinity, but that he had not as yet received a reply.

A letter was read from Mr. H. Davis of Salem, asking assistance for destitute friends residing there, but as we understand that there is an association in Phila whose object is the relief of East Sea friends, and that they have an unexpended balance on hand, the President is directed to hand the matter over to them. The Ex Com reported having passed by the B&O RR to Hamilton Co. Ind, Thomas Barber, and Susan Mac, and eight children also having obtained a free passage to Phila for a woman and three children, six members of our Society, also having passed two young men, members of the Society and six young men descendants of friends to Indiana.

The Ex Com. was directed to have a number of cards printed, containing full directions as to how friends should act, and giving them full information of such matters as it is desirable they should know.

The Committee of Lodgings reported, that they had selected the Home of the Sanitary Com. as a suitable place where our friends should be taken to, and Dr. Thomas and Richard Luning were directed to parange with the Sanitary Com.
