REPORT

OF THE

SUPERINTENDENT OF EDUCATION.

To "Baltimore Association of Friends."

You will observe by this Second Annual Report, that the work for the past year has been more extensive than was anticipated in some prospective remarks at the close of my first report. It was there stated that the Schools for the second year would be fewer in number than during the first, but more efficient.

It is safe to say that the Schools included in the present report have been a great improvement on last year, but in order that they might be more accessible to Friends living remotely as they do in many of the Monthly Meetings, the number was necessarily increased from 30 to 38. With this number the schools generally, with the attendance of many who do not profess with us, have been sufficiently large, and in some instances, inconveniently so.

The whole number attending these 38 Schools has been 2,143. Of these 1,243 were Friends, and 900 not members. The terms are—that North Carolina Friends shall furnish school houses, board the teachers, and provide fuel, with tuition *free*, and that those who do not profess with us, pay one dollar per month. I repeat this here, in order more clearly to bring up some points in connection with our work. It has enabled North Carolina Friends to appropriate means for school houses—and the outlay of many who have felt a deep interest in the work has been heavy, considering their means, notwithstanding the aid you have rendered. Friends generally have shown their appreciation of your aid in the eagerness with which they avail them-
