

the parents could afford to contribute, and what  
 could be obtained from the Public School Fund.  
 This information, together with our own knowledge  
 of the different localities, acquired in former years,  
 was of great use to us in apportioning assistance  
 to the different schools. It has not been possible  
 to pursue the same plan with regard to  
 Tennessee, Dr. Garner being too much pressed  
 with his practical duties to write out the details  
 of the needs of each neighborhood, and, relying  
 on our knowledge of his general work & experience,  
 we sent him sums from time to time to dispose  
 of according to his own judgment. We have had  
 very satisfactory statements from Friends who have  
 visited his schools and assisted in his Missionary  
 labors. We enclose a brief statement from him  
 of the work thus far accomplished, and also  
 one from F. D. Blair of the schools in North  
 Carolina; both reports being necessarily incomplete,  
 many of the schools not having finished their  
 term. The report of the Missionary Board of  
 North Carolina Yearly Meeting will not be made  
 up until Tenth Month next. New York, Ohio  
 and Baltimore Yearly Meetings have each worked
