Our beloved Friend Joseph John Furney from England, also several brethren from neighbouring Yearly Meetings, are acceptably with us.

The Committee on the bequest of the late Sarah Lane made the following report, which was approved and the committee were released.

To the Meeting for Sufferings,

The Committee appointed in the 9th Month 1830 on the subject of the bequest of the late Sarah Lane and subsequently continued to assist the Trustees appointed by the Yearly Meeting to receive the said bequest. Report, that the necessary attention has been paid to the subject, and that we are not aware of any benefit likely to result from a ^{further} continuance of the committee; the Trustees being duly authorised by the Yearly Meeting to receive, and realise the bequest whenever it is obtained. We are informed that in consequence of the Amount of the Funds belonging to the Estate of Sarah Lane being deficient; but little if any of this Legacy will be paid.
