I wrote you on the 30th of May in reference to the Ashton Meeting House title to its property, and gave you a reference to some records we had in Baltimore and asking some questions for information.

Since then I have found that in 1912 I took up the question of the Ashton Monthly Meeting property and prepared a deed from Philip T. Stabler, Louisa T. Brooke, and Harott M. Haviland, surviving trustees of the Ashton Monthly Meeting, and from Charles G. Porter, of Montgomery County, to the Ashton Monthly Meeting of Friends, a corporation. This deed is recorded in Liber No. 230, folio 475, of the land records of Montgomery County. I had not this deed before me at the time I wrote to you.

Perhaps this deed corrects the trouble that you had in mind. However, I shall wait until I hear further from you.
