The regular annual meeting of the Permanent Board (Homeood) was held this date, ten members being present.

The only business to come before the members was the Insurance Report.

In general these reports were acceptable.

The Clerk was instructed to write to Deer Creek asking if \$5000 is actually adequate and to Fishertown also to inquire if \$3000 is sufficient. insurance. Deer Creek carries only \$20,000 which seems hardly sufficient to the Permanent Board, so the Clerk was instructed to write a similar letter to that meeting. Corinth reports \$8000 coverage on the Meeting House and the Board instructed the Clerk to inquire if the Parsonage and other buildings are covered. The Clerk is to write again to Hopwell and Somerton, both of which meetings failed to send in reports.

The Permanent Board feels that by adjusting insurance so that a ^{small} premium falls ~~due~~ due each year the various meetings would find it easier to meet the premium payments than where the insurance expires every five years, whereupon a larger amount of money has to be put out to meet this obligation.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned.

In accordance with their Act of Incorporation, the Trustees of the Thos. King Benevolent Co. of Darlington, Maryland make this, their 82nd annual report.

The King Fund has been of assistance in three cases.

One family lost much of their clothing and furniture in a fire.

Another case was that of a young woman in the community who had rheumatic fever as a child and has been an invalid ever since. She was able to complete her High School education with the help of visiting teachers; now, completed house-bound, she is studying with the Harford Junior College. This work is done by telephone - a very expensive setup; as a fund handled by the Thos. King of Harford County was formed and a number of neighborhood organizations are helping.

The third case was an eleven year old girl who was very severely burned and will need much skin grafting.
