

Walker McClun Bond

Dec. 12, 1875 -- Feb. 9, 1957

Walker McClun Bond, a birthright member of Centre Meeting, Winchester, Virginia and Hopewell Monthly Meeting, was born December 12, 1875 in the old family home on Apple Pie Ridge in Frederick County, Virginia - the second son of John L. and Ann Lupton Bond.

He was educated at the Shenandoah Valley Academy, George School, and Swarthmore College, where he majored in Engineering. In 1903 he married Grace L. Wright of Ohio.

He was interested and active in many social and civic organizations, but his Meeting was first in his heart and mind. He served his local Meeting, the Yearly Meeting, and the Friends' General Conference in many capacities. He took an active interest in the Friends' Service Committee from its 1917 beginning.

Walker McClun Bond was known as an Engineer, Agriculturist, Civic Leader, Humanitarian, and Soil Authority. Some of the services in part were: President of the Frederick County Fruit Growers Association; President Virginia State Horticulture Society; Chairman of National and State Farm Labor Advisory Committee; Chairman Lord Fairfax Soil Conservation District; Chairman of the Virginia District Soil Conservation Supervisors. In 1947 he received the Junior Chamber of Commerce Outstanding Citizen Award.

On November 23, 1935, he married Carrie D. Lupton.

Walker McClun Bond loved life, and his was one of gracious living; he loved friends and there were many who looked to him for counsel; he loved his home - there all who came found hospitality at its best. His was a life well spent.
