He was a member of the Richmond Kiwanis Club, having served 10 years as secretary, and had a perfect attendance record for twenty years. He was a member of the Richmond Torch Club.

Emmet Frazer devoted most of his life to the service of others. His first work was performed at Friends' Indian School, Quaker Bridge, New York, where he taught for about two years. He was employed as Bursar and as a member of the faculty of Virginia Union University from 1928 to 1945. He resigned that position to become Director of the Interdenominational Religious Work Foundation, where he served during the period 1945 to 1955. In this capacity he was Chaplain at the State Penitentiary, as well as being responsible for religious activities at all of the Virginia penal institutions and tuberculosis sanatoria. Since 1955 he had been employed as Office Manager of a local camera supply firm.

In addition to being a faithful member of the Society of Friends, he entered into many interdenominational projects. He was at ease in association with people of other faiths and frequently emphasized in his own meeting certain phases of other denominations which he felt would
