Ans 1 All our meetings have been kept up and generally
attended by the most of our members, some deficiency
acknowledged in the attendance of those held on week
days, a drowsy disposition therein not sufficiently guarded

against by all; clear of other unbecoming behavior
as far as appears

A good degree of love is maintained by friends
toward each other tale bearing and detraction
discouraged by many; when differences arise endeavours
are used to end them

Some friends in each meeting endeavour by example
to precept to educate their children and those
under their care in plainness of speech deportment
and apparel; to guard them against reading per-
nicious books, and the corrupt conversation of the
world; also to encourage their frequent reading the holy
scriptures; yet a manifest deficiency is apparent in
these particulars

4th

Clear of importing wending, distilling or the
unnecessary use of spirituous liquors as far as appears
frequenting places of dissipation mostly avoided
moderation not enough observed on all occasions

5th

The necessities of the poor are attended to and
in good measure relieved; and some care taken of
the school education of their children

6th

Mostly careful with respect to an healing ministry
there in regard to the other parts of the Query as far
as appears

7th

Friends appear mostly careful to live within the
bounds of their circumstances, and to avoid involving
themselves in business beyond their ability to manage
no apparent breach of the latter part of the Query

8th

Friends appear generally careful to support a testimony
against slavery; those under our care who have had
their freedom secured, are in a good degree provided
for and some care to instruct them in useful learning
