Summary

1st Our meetings for worship and discipline by the general
ity of our members some remissness acknowledged in the atten-
dance of those held on week days unbecoming behaviour there
in mostly avoided, the hour nearly observed.

2nd Friends appear careful to maintain love towards each
other in a good measure as becomes our christian profession
tale bearing and detraction mostly discouraged; no apparent
differences.

3rd Many of our members are in a good degree concerned to
educate their children and those under their care in plainness
of speech deportment and apparel; to guard them against
reading pernicious books and from the corrupt conversation of the
world and to encourage their reading the scriptures, yet
we have to acknowledge considerable deviations from
simplicity in dress and address.

4th Clear of importing vendoring distilling or the unprop-
er use of spirituous liquors as far as appears; one report
mentions the attending places of diversion not sufficiently
guarded against; moderation and temperance in a good
degree observed.

5th The necessities of the poor are inspected & in a good
degree relieved; care is taken to promote the school education
of their children.

6th It appears that many friends are concerned to support
our testimony in the several particulars of this query.

7th The contents of this query nearly observed.

8th Careful to bear a testimony against slavery the one report
mentions some deficiencies herein which are under care.
