1st Ans. All our meetings for worship
 and discipline have been held; those on
 first day mornings are attended by our
 members generally, those in the evening are
 not so well attended, and on 5th day
 they are very small, Unbecoming
 behavior is avoided, The hour of
 meeting is observed by most friends
 though one report says "Some are very
 remiss in this respect."

2nd Ans. Friends appear to maintain Love
 towards each other becoming our Christian
 Profession, Tale bearing & detraction are
 discouraged, No apparent differences
 amongst us

3rd Ans. The trust most friends endeavor
 by example and precept to bring up their
 children and those under their care
 in the Nurture and admonition of the

Lord, and in the plainness of speech
 department and apparel which the Gospel
 requires. They endeavour to guard them
 against reading pernicious books and
 from the corrupt conversation of the World,
 and encourage them to read the Holy
 Scriptures

4th Ans. We believe that our testimony to
 a Free Gospel Ministry is maintained,
 except the occasional attendance of some
 of our members on a paid Ministry

5th Ans. Our testimony against distilled
 "Spirituos Liquors is maintained (except
 a few cases under care)

Frequenting taverns and attending places
 of diversion ^{we} believe are avoided, and
 moderation and temperance are generally
 maintained observed.

6th Ans. The necessities of the poor are
 inspected and when occasion requires
 relief is afforded

7th Ans. We believe Friends maintain
 a faithful testimony against Oaths
 Military Services, clandestine trade, Prize
 goods lotteries & Slavery, Those of the African
 under our care are suitably provided for
 and they are instructed in useful learning

8th Ans. Friends appear careful to live
 within the bounds of their circumstances
 and avoid involving themselves in business
 beyond their ability to manage or engaging
 in hazardous or speculative trade, or
 defrauding the public revenue. They appear
 to be just in their dealings and generally
 punctual in complying with their engagements.
